



Comments: "We naturally become speculative when we write upon Archery. It is associated, in the minds of everyone, with those beautiful, golden days which we, with a credulity fostered by a vast lapse of time, imagine existed without interruption in the period of our national infancy. It is blended with our dreams of England's growing glory; it is bound up with classic memories of even remote antiquity; and, consequently, we reverence it with affection, and welcome its vigorous revival with unalloyed pleasure..... It is with these convictions that the Publishers and Editors undertook the task which is now to a certain extent completed. They feel that the importance which Archery is rapidly assuming as a National Pastime becoming, indeed, in every respect a national institution recognised by the nation called for the publication of a work which would provide the archer and archeress with every detail relating to their favourite amusement, forming a record also of all the Public Meetings held in each amusement, forming a record also of all the Public Meetings held in each season, and a chronicle of the Prize Matches of Private Clubs, so far as may be agreeable to those most intimately concerned" (Preface 1864, pp.viiviii).

This periodical was not published from 1867-1876. In the departments field, for original papers the 1973 Pilot Project states that it contains a list of original papers for previous volumes of "Register."


Comments: "The Architect is intended to be a professional, artistic, and technical journal of the first class. Its pages will be open to all subjects connected with the art, the science, or the business of Building, taken in the widest sense. The Professional Architect and the Civil Engineer, the Builder, the Art Workman, and the Mechanic, will each find *The Architect* treating upon subjects which are of importance to himself" (1:1, p.1).

Roberts says this publication superseded the *Building News and Engineering Journal.* "The journal was said in an 1885 advertisement to contain 'the fullest and most complete list of contracts open and tenders delivered of any paper in the world'. The NPD of 1898 described it thus: 'fully established as the recognised representative of architects, civil engineers and builders. The best writers obtainable contribute articles on their special subjects, and the works of all the leading architects of Great Britain are illustrated in it from week to week'."

"[*T*]*he Architect* was modeled on the *Builder*, but intended to appeal to a more select audience. In using a different typeface from the *Builder* and more white area per page, it was designed to make the *Builder* look old-

fashioned. Printed on good-quality paper. Indexes very inadequate.... Good-quality illustration, on blank-reverse sheets, separately bound. Many Sprague 'Ink Photos' and photolithos. Readership: The Journal was said in an advertisement of 1885 to have a 'large circulation aiming Architects, Contractors, Builders, Surveyors, Engineers, and others'. Distribution by subscription and retail sale" (Richardson). The subtitle, "a journal of structural and decorative art" was added at no 101, Jan 1919 until no 115, 12 Mar 1926. Bolton cites as the subtitle: "an illustrated weekly journal of art, civil engineering, and building." The number of pages varies per issue.



Comments: Prospect and retrospect states "We believe that at no previous time was it so important, on the one hand, to the public, that the resources of architectural knowledge and professional skill should be developed; and on the other, to the profession, that the prevalent misconception as to the office and duties of the professor should be removed. All the vital questions of the day in which the architect has his true vocation, and he can when properly appealed to, bring to bear the facts and deductions which education evolves from the principles of science, upon the improvement of the physical and moral condition of a teeming population--upon the social and intellectual comfort and enlightenment of man." (page 1 vol 1 - taken from the "Architect and Building Operative"; Richardson and Thorne have the start date at 1847. It "faltered in 1850, becoming the Architect and Building Gazette for a few months" (Richardson and Thorne). "We have made arrangements ... to present to our readers a series of ... subjects connected with the operative arts, viz.: Masonry--Carpentry and Joinery - Decoration -- Iron Work -- Warming and Ventilating -- House Surveying and Measuring--Drainage, Waterage, and Sewerage, all of which will be methodically treated, so that the volumes of The Architect and Building Operative, when bound up, will contain a library of standard practical works of reference, prepared expressly for those whose suffrages we now solicit..." (no 1, p.5).
